As you may be aware, we have been experiencing an excess of water on the bridal trails in our community. We would like to request that you take some time to walk your fence line and check for any drainage issues, broken pipes or malfunctioning sprinklers that may be contributing to this problem.

It is crucial that we all take responsibility for maintaining our properties to ensure the proper functioning of the drainage system. Any blockage or damaged sprinklers can result in flooding or erosion, which can cause significant damage to both your property and the community trails.

Therefore, we ask that you inspect your property for any drainage issues, including broken pipes or sprinklers, and take the necessary steps to repair them promptly. If you are unable to do so, we suggest contacting a professional to assist you with the repairs.







We also encourage homeowners to clear any debris from the drain grates and ensure that water can flow freely. Keeping the drain grates clear of debris helps prevent blockages that can lead to excess water on the trails. Finally, we urge you to inspect your fence line for any wear and tear that could contribute to water drainage issues. If you notice any damage, please make the necessary repairs to prevent further issues.

We appreciate your cooperation in maintaining our community and ensuring the safety and well-being of all residents. Thank you for your attention to this matter.

EQUESTRIAN SERVICES TIP OF THE MONTH

HERE WE GO AGAIN. SPRING IS HERE, WARMER WEATHER IS HERE, AND FLIES ARE HERE.

And, not just flies - here are the four main insects that create misery for our horses:

FLIES (BITING STABLE, BLACK AND HOUSE), MOSQUITOES AND MIDGES.

Biting Stable Flies and House Flies These are the most common flies found around horses. They are found both inside stalls and outside in paddocks and fields, and make your horse miserable by inflicting painful bites and irritating eyes, nose and mouth.

Mosquitoes These insects are most active at dusk, and are most feared because they transmit West Nile Virus, a disease that can be fatal to unvaccinated horses.

Midges (also known as Biting Gnats and No-See-Ums) These tiny insects are very difficult to see, but cause great misery to horses. They typically bite horses along their midline and groin area, and this often causes welts and intense itchiness. Some horses become so reactive that they mutilate themselves by scratching and biting at the afflicted areas, a condition known as "Sweet Itch".

Black Flies (also known as Buffalo Gnats) These are the small greyish-looking flies that you see hovering around the horses' ears They attack in great numbers especially at dusk and will create bloody sores in their ears.

Now, how to take action:

Let's start with protecting the horse. Properly fitted and maintained fly masks with ear protection and frequent application of fly spray is a must. Pay particular attention to applying the spray on their lower legs and belly. For the face, and for horses that are worried about sprays, use a mitt.

For the stall, daily removal of horse manure and urine will assist in reducing fly numbers. In addition, you can install fly spray misting devices, either battery operated or professionally installed with electric timers. Fans are also a great help, but need to be installed with safety in mindfan must be designed for barn/outdoor use, with a sealed motor and both fan and electric cord must be inaccessible to the horses.

For the barn and paddock areas in general, flytraps can be very effective in controlling fly numbers. Since they are designed to attract flies, they should be placed away from horse living areas, such as near your manure bins. Fly predators are tiny nonstinging insects that can help control fly populations, but are not a stand-alone solution. Areas that stay moist are breeding grounds for insects, and weeds and overgrown vegetation provide resting and hiding places for insects. These areas should be cleared and dried up as much as possible.

While it may be impossible to completely eliminate these insect pests, the above suggestions will greatly improve your horses' quality of life.



NOTICE FROM THE GATES AND PATROL SERVICES COMMITTEE

LOS ANGELES COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT LICENSE PLATE READERS INSTALLED AT THE CITY'S THREE GATES

The City and the Hidden Hills Community Association recently collaborated on the purchase and installation of Automated License Plate Readers (ALPR) at all three of the City's entrances and exits. ALPR cameras will scan each vehicle license plate as the vehicle enters and exits the City. ALPR data can only be accessed by the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department or other law enforcement agencies.

ALPR serves three main functions for law enforcement: (1) If a vehicle associated with a warrant enters the City, an alert will be sent to the Malibu/Lost Hills Sheriff's Station and, depending on the severity of the warrant, a Deputy may be dispatched to the City to find the vehicle; (2) Detectives will now have the ability to put a flag on suspected vehicles and receive alerts if they enter the City or if picked up on ALPR cameras throughout Los Angeles County; and (3) Detectives can access historical ALPR data to determine if suspected vehicles were in the City, what time they entered, and what time they left. This information could prove valuable in investigating any criminal occurrences in the City.

The Hidden Hills ALPR units join a growing number of similar ALPR units throughout the Malibu/Lost Hills patrol area and all of Los Angeles County. Neighboring cities have installed ALPR cameras on traffic signals, portable trailers, and patrol vehicles


